

How to Raise an Antiracist Author: Ibram X. Kendi

Do you ask yourself, "How do we talk to our children about racism?" or "How do we teach children to be antiracist?"

Kendi's book combines personal experience as a parent with scholarly expertise to show how racism affects every step of a child's life. Like many caregivers, he feared talking to his child would stain her innocence and steal her joy. Through research and experience, he realized that raising a child to be anti-racist would actually protect them, while preserving their joy and innocence.

Teaching students about the reality of racism and the myth of race provides a protective education in our diverse and unequal world. Building anti-racist societies safeguards children from the harms of racism.

Combines a century of scientific research with a vulnerable and compelling personal narrative of his journey as a parent and child in school. The chapters follow the stages of child development from pregnancy to teenager. It is never too early or too late to start raising young people to be anti-racist.

Young children are avid observers and questioners of their world, but adults often shut down or postpone conversations on complicated topics because it's hard to know where to begin. Tackling issues about race and gender from the age of two not only helps children understand what they see, but increases self-awareness, self-esteem, and allows them to recognize and confront things that are unfair, like discrimination and prejudice.

This first book in the series begins the conversation on race, with a supportive approach that considers both the child and the adult. Stunning art follows the simple and interactive text while the call-outs offer additional resources and ideas for extending these discussions.



that range from a physical disability to language brokering, offering an opportunity to take pride in a personal story and connect to collective struggle for justice.

The group bond grounds the message of ally-ship and equality. When things get hard, the characters support each other for who they are. Advocating respect and inclusion, this book is a necessary tool for learning to embrace, rather than shy away from, difference.
